

KILKENNY COMMERCIAL SCHOOL, GREEN STREET.

The annual examinations in connection with the Irish Society of Arts and Commerce, which have been conducted during the past fortnight at the Kilkenny School of Shorthand, Typewriting and Commercial Training, Green St. (Principal, Mr. J. E. Cole, F.I.S.W.), concluded on the 29th May. Thirty candidates entered, and the subjects taken included Shorthand (60, 80, 110, and 130 words a minute), Typewriting, Book-keeping, Arithmetic, and Handwriting. Mr. T. W. O'Hanranan, J.P., and Mr. W. J. England, kindly acted as chairman and secretary respectively of the Examining Committee, and Mr. M. O'Rourke assisted as superintendent. Owing to the admirable arrangements made by the capable Principal of the School, the proceedings in connection with the various examinations worked most smoothly. The results will be announced in due course.

Hurling in the Streets.

Head Constable Frizelle prosecuted Francis Marchetta, Green St., for hurling on the public street, to the danger of passers-by, on the 24th May.

Mr. J. E. Cole, Green St., stated that on last Sunday he saw the defendant and two or three smaller boys hurling on the street. They were outside his school windows, and as he was afraid they would break the windows with the ball he spoke to them and asked them to go away. The defendant looked at him contemptuously and took no notice of his remarks, but went on with the hurling. Witness told them that if they did not go away he would have to tell the police, whereupon the defendant assumed a defiant attitude and said to witness, "You can do your best; I hurled in the street before you came to it, and I will hurl in it after you are gone." Witness then sent a message to Head Constable Frizelle, and when Constable Mullany interviewed Marchetta afterwards he refused to give his name, but said, "You cannot prosecute me; you did not see me do anything."

Head Constable Frizelle: Fortunately we have a man who is not afraid to come forward and prove it.

Defendant said he walked away when Mr Cole told him. He admitted making use of the remarks that he had hurled on the streets before Mr. Cole came there, and that he would hurl there when he was gone.

The chairman said the defendant would be fined 2s. 6d. and costs.
